GIFTS AND INCENTIVES

Most seniors in Chorkor, worked in occupations that didn't offer them pension or social security ; so as they have surpassed the age to work they are left with very little to care for themselves. The day is also a way of showing appreciation to them, for allowing the existence of the organisation in this particular community.

LEARNING A NEW LANGUAGE IN GHANA

FINN (A.F.S VOLUNTEER)

Different from what you might be used to in Europe or America, Ghana, or West Africa in general, are not one-language nations. There is no such thing like "Ghanaish" or the Ghanaian language. In Ghana, you can find up to 75 different languages. Some of these "dialects" are very different from one another, whereas some are quite similar. If traced back, most of those dialects will lead you to one specific ethnic group or tribe who established that dialect thousands of years ago. The particular area of Ghana which was inhabited by the members of one ethical group, is nowadays the area where their dialect is still being spoken.

Therefore the 75 different dialects are spread throughout Ghana.

As a volunteer, the first dialects I came in contact with were Twi and Ga.

From what I know after 3 months in Ghana, Twi is the most popular and supraregional dialect. Many people, even though they originally speak a different dialect, are able to speak Twi.

Therefore, Twi is the dialect which we volunteers were recommended to learn. I wanted to do that but because neither my host nor my colleagues and the children at B.A.S.I.C.S speak Twi, it was very difficult for me. I am not the type of person who can learn such a difficult language without the help of a native speaker. The other dialect I mentioned earlier, Ga, is mostly spoken in parts of Accra like Chorkor. This is where B.A.S.I.C.S International is located. Due to that, the mother tongue of most of the children who come to B.A.S.I.C.S is Ga. Originally I never thought of learning Ga, but some weeks ago some children from my class and I somehow had the idea that they could teach me Ga. I really liked the idea and the thought of being able to communicate with them even better.

We started with some basic expressions which could be useful at work like "sit down, come here, how are you" etc. Even knowing those basics is very nice. When I talk in Ga to the kids who don't know that I am learning the language, their reactions are very priceless. When I leave Ghana in 8 months, maybe, I might even be able to have a real conversation with them in Ga.



SAY IT LOUD : ETIQUETTE BY KEREN AMATTEY (FACILITATOR)

Every Monday at 5:30pm, after having a hearty dinner, the children prepare for SAY IT LOUD. If you don't already know what SAY IT LOUD is, it is a discussion we have with the children about issues they face in the society. Basically, a time to interact with the kids and get them to speak their minds on selected topics. This past Monday, the topic," ETIQUETTE" was presented to the children. With each topic we choose, there is a relatable memory verse attached to it. Some of the questions we posed to the children were, "What comes to mind when you think about etiquette." and ``Mention the types of etiquette that you know." Etiquette is important and the earlier you teach a child, the longer it stays with them. At BASICS, we teach children to eat with a fork and knife and not to talk when eating.

US NAVY BAND VISITS GHANA



B.A.S.I.C.S was among three NGOs to have their students honoured with a musical performance by the US Navy TopSide band in Jamestown on 22nd March. The 8-member team, which is stationed in Naples, Italy, was hosted by the US Embassy. The band performed a variety of New Orleans music, rhythm and blues. It entertained the children so much that they joined them by clapping and dancing. The purpose of the event was to expose the children to a different side of music as well as deepen the relations between the two countries.





"Music is a thing that connects people, gets us all dancing, smiling and happy and being in Ghana, in this beautiful country, playing for these kids here is going to be an experience I am going to remember my whole life", said Musician Surface Welfare Kent Grover, leader of the band. We did not attend school due to the inability of my parents to afford school fees. B.A.S.I.C.S became my saving grace at my time of need. Through the help of Ms Patricia Wilkins, I was enrolled in the B.A.S.I.C.S transition program. The transition program is a restart program under the "Back to School" program which helps train and rehabilitate children, ages 6 and above, who have had little or no education. The transition program also helps prepare children for mainstream schooling. We are taught basic etiquette and social skills. B.A.S.I.C.S has been responsible for my education and development since I was a child and continues to do so. I live in a community where education is not a priority. You are either expected to be a fisherman, following in the footsteps of your father, or a fish smoker like your mother. Thanks to Auntie Pat, I am the first in my entire family to have completed Junior High School, Senior High School and now an undergraduate at the Ho Technical University studying Industrial Arts. It has not been an easy journey for

Arts. It has not been an easy journey for me, and there have been times when I felt like giving up on my education especially after four years of trying to get into the university. I have learnt a lot through this period and one of the major lessons was not to give up and that no matter the situation, there is always light at the end of the tunnel. I owe a lot of gratitude to two people in particular, Auntie Pat and to my sponsors for their unconditional love and support. I say AYEKOO!!

WAAKYE AS A DELICACY

"WAAKYE IS ONE OF MY FAVOURITE GHANAIAN DISHES", JAKOB (A.F.S VOLUNTEER) SAID.





Waakye has become one of the most popular dishes in Ghana over the past few years. It comes from the Northern part of Ghana, but is eaten through all regions of Ghana. The dish is a blend of both rice and blackeyed peas cooked in sorghum leaves that gives it that reddish-brown colour. It is impressive how food culture can change in a short amount of time. Waakye used to be a delicacy that was enjoyed at lunch or dinner. Now, it is popular to eat in the morning, even as early as 7am. It is usually eaten with "shito (pepper sauce) ' and/or stew as well as boiled eggs, spaghetti, salad, fish, meat and what is known as "wele". You can say it's a huge meal!! But don't worry you are allowed to pick and choose.

HISTORY ABOUT GHANA

Ghana is a peaceful country. Ghana means "a warrior king". Ghana was then called the Gold Coast. Countries like Britain, Sweden, Portugal came to colonise Ghana.

The first European country to arrive in Gold Coast was the Portuguese. They came in the year 1471. They came to meet Nana (King) Kwamena Ansah at Elmina at the Central region of Ghana (cape coast). The King gave them a piece of land and they built the first castle which is the Elmina castle in 1482. The Portuguese came to trade with the Gold Coast and later started trading from gold to humans. Because of this a lot of wars started like the Yaa Asantewaa war, Sagrenti war, Akatamanso war and so many more. In the year 1847, the Britain also came to Ghana and started doing the slave trade. Britain introduced formal education, crops like cocoa and also introduced new towns and cities. On the 24th August 1947, the Ghanaians formed a political party which was U.G.C.C.(United Gold Coast Convention). The motto of the party was "self government in the shortest possible time." The leaders of the party were Paa Grant and J.B danguah and the members were the ig 6. On the 12th April 1949, another political party was formed by Dr Kwame Nkrumah which was the C.P.P (Convention People's Party). The motto of the party was self government now. On 24th August 1947, J.B. Danquah suggested the name Ghana for the Gold Coasters. On 6th March 1957, Ghana gained independence by Kwame Nkrumah, the first President of Ghana.


