1619- 2019 marks the Year of the Return

As 2019 marks the 400th year since the first documented arrival of enslaved Africans to the shores of America (The Year of Return), it is necessarily a year of both reflection on the past and anticipation for the future. With that as a guiding principle, The African American Association of Ghana (AAAG) with the support of the United States Embassy of Ghana invited Dr. Nia Imara, a lecturer at Harvard University, to speak to Ghanaian youth about the importance of STEAM(Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) education. Dr. Imara is an Astrophysicist and an artist, and is the first African-American woman to earn a PhD in Astrophysics at the University of California, Berkeley.









"In a world with so much injustice, violence, hatred, and fear, art is important because, it can empower people and help them find their voice" says Dr. Imara during her presentation dubbed Tunapenda Mwanga (We Love Light). We are the light of the world. Light means Power, Beauty and Transformation.

She surely got them riveted through her presentation. How many stars are there in the galaxy? Well, there are 20 billion stars in the galaxy say Dr. Imara, and we learnt it takes 24 hours for the earth to spin around the sun.
