When I first arrived in Ghana, I attended a similar celebration in Koforidua, Ghana (located in the Eastern Region); where I was given the privilege of making a presentation; and B.A.S.I.C.S donated over 500 books and school supplies to the local school. It was such an honor for me to attend; and be amongst great people like Micheal Addo; the founder of Kama Pharmaceutical and Ministers of States. The outfit I worn; was the first outfit I purchased from Cadling Fashions and after 20 years I am still wearing their designs and actually serving on the Board of Directors for their foundation; which empowers women with teaching a trade of sewing and giving housing. much as that day, was so important to me then; I have attended over 100 events similar to that and now they all look the same: until NOW.

It's only been one academic year; that many of the children were transferred to The Great Kwame Nkrumah School; and it's been a challenge for many to match up academically with the children that have been attending for a while. Their new environment was a challenge that most welcomed; and proved to be a great investment for B.A.S.I.C.S. In addition to some of the children receiving acknowledgement for their academic achievement in Math, English, Reading, etc; some of the children showcased their creative skills in dance and singing. But if I had to say, the best part of the story is "100% of our students were promoted to the next grade. One Grade UP!

School vacated at the end of July, and during the 6 weeks break, most students are left to roam the streets, or work in family business (fishing or selling goods). B.A.S.I.C.S made a commitment nearly 15 years ago (after we learned a child had died during a long break; because she had malaria and the family didn't have funds to send her to the hospital), to be accessible to children year round, and fill the gaps that were normally seen as major contributors to children dropping out of school or something worse.

Each long or short break, B.A.S.I.C.S finds exciting ways of engaging students, and puts a call out for extra volunteers with skills and love for children. This year, many of our older students who have completed high school recently also stepped up to teach a class or lead an activity.

B.A.S.I.C.S children spent the time, exploring and engaging their creative minds with activities such as beading, crocheting, baking, photography, chess, computer, screen printing, poetry, singing and hat making bingo games. A walk into our compound will just let you know how well we are spending our summer break. With the help of volunteers and staff, there has never been a boring day at B.A.S.I.C.S.



















For 19 years, we have given the children a wonderful vacation program from utilizing borrowed spaces, rented spaces and for the last facilities, borrowed space and for the last 8 years in our facility in Chorkor; but the best is yet to come.

## **Chalewote Street Chess Championship**

This weekend was lit! B.A.S.I.C.S Chess Team participated in a street Chess game held at the Chalewote Festival, a street art fair in Jamestown, Accra. The word Chalewote (a Ga word which means ('Man, let's go!" and normally associated with flip flop sandals), is a festival of arts and culture which happens each year after the celebration of Homowo. The festival is an alternative platform that brings art, music, dance and performance out of the galleries and onto the streets of Jamestown, Accra.

This year in collaboration with the Ghana Chess Association and Street Chess Ghana to help promote street chess in the country; players were invited to a day long Knockout game - you keep playing so long as you are able to defeat others. Twenty three students (girls and boys) from B.A.S.I.C.S participated in these highly competitive games.

We emerged winners with 14 year old; Jeremiah Adjetey coming first in the Junior category and 18 year old; Daniel Otoo as the champion in the Senior category.

## Homowo Celebration

Homowo is a festival of harvest celebrated by the Ga people located in the Greater Accra region of Ghana. On August 17, the people of Ga Mashie (Chorkor, Jamestown, Korle Gonno and it's environs) celebrated the Homowo festival. With the traditional leaders adorned in red, they sprinkled their traditional food (Kpepkple - a maize meal eaten with palm nut soup) around every corner of the street and homes.

The celebration includes marching down roads and streets beating drums, chanting, face painting, singing and traditional dances. On this day, there is usually a lot of traffic and roads are usually blocked off to accommodate the festival.





## "YEYEEYEE" Twin Festival celebration.

Gorgeously adorned in white apparel, all twins in Chorkor paraded in a beautiful street procession. This is an aspect of the Homowo festival that many look forward to each year. This is a show of pride and a glamorous occasion as each twin is hand held and paraded on the street with their parents amidst singing and dancing as people cheer them on the streets.

In the Ga (a local tribe in Ghana) tradition, it is believed that children are a blessing from God, and when it's given in the form of twins, they believe it's a special blessing, hence the need to have a special celebration for them.







Customarily, on the festival day, the twins are given special baths to cleanse them from any misfortune. Afterwards, a special meal of mashed yam known as Ota( a sacred dish made from hard-boiled eggs, mashed yam, and palm oil) is prepared for the twins and they are pampered to appease their spirits. Once this is done, the bowl containing the leftovers used in bathing them are carried in a procession and dumped along the Korle Naabu. In Chorkor, there is a special cemetery only for twins and people from the royal family. This goes to show the special attachment they hold to twins.
